Sexting is becoming a major problem for our youth and they are still not understanding the short/long term consequences that can happen.

Some studies show 1 out of every 5 kids have sent or received nude/semi nude photos. Survey also shows that teens who send these pictures KNOW the picture will be shared with strangers. NOT GOOD!


Recent survey taken showed that of the kids who have been involved in sending nude or semi nude photos, 15% of them sent the image to someone they only know from the Internet. That is a complete stranger!

If a picture makes it to the Internet, it is permanent. It is a digital footprint of our child's past and will not go away.


As I discussed in my previous newsletter, when images or information is sent over the phone and if GPS is enabled, we may also be sharing our exact location, not just our image. What is very scary about this fact is that if 15% of kids who are involved in sexting are sending the image

to strangers, they may also be sharing their exact location with that same stranger. Not a safe practice.

We should all use caution as to what pictures we take with mobile devices and who we share them with. If you are taking pictures and sending them, turn your GPS device off prior to taking the picture. This will prevent the GPS element from being added to the image.
